The F-1 Academic Student Visa allows students to enter the United States to attend a full-time program of study at an accredited college, university, seminary, conservatory, academic high school, elementary school, or other academic institution or in a language training program. The student must be enrolled in a program or course of study that culminates in a degree, diploma, or certificate and the school itself must be authorized by the U.S. government to accept international students. This article aims to provide international students with a better understanding of the necessary steps in the student visa process. The basic criteria to secure F-1 visa status include the following:

1. The student must be enrolled in an "academic" educational program, a language-training program, or a vocational program;

2. The sponsoring school itself must be approved by the Student and Exchange Visitors Program (SEVP);

3. The student must be enrolled in a full-time study program at the institution;

4. The student must be proficient in English or

4. The student must be proficient in English or be emolled in courses leading to English proficiency, above the control of the first funds available for self-support during the entire proposed of the student must have sufficient funds available for self-support during the entire proposed course of study; and

5. The student must maintain a residence abroad that he/she has no intention of giving up.

Student visas are issued by U.S. embassies or consulates abroad. Before one appears at a U.S. embassy or consulate to obtain an F visa, the prospective student must first apply to and be accepted by a SEVVI-approved school. Once the student is accepted by the emolled in the Student and Exchange Visitor Information System (SEVIS) and pay the SEVIS 1.901 fee. expiration of his authorized visa status will obtain a mandatory 3-year bar to re-enter into the United States. One who overstays for 365 days will incur a mandatory 10-year bar to re-entry. It is, therefore, of paramount importance that students seek advice from an immigration attorney on options to live and/or work in the United States post-graduation with the proper authorization.
