or the past three years, The Jewish Center of Teaneck has held the Joy Amsel Memorial Community Biur Chametz. For three decades, friends of the Amsel family have participated in a memorial tribute to Joy Amsel by getting together before the start of Passover in the family's backyard. There they gather around the fire pit to share in the act of Biur Chametz. Otherwise known as The Big Bread Burn, Biur Chametz involves destroying all leavened bread to make households ready for Passover.

Last year, the event extended beyond family and friends to embrace the community at large, hundreds of people coming out despite the drizzly weather. Rabbi Lawrence Zierler, of the Jewish Center of Teaneck and one of the borough's volunteer Fire Department chaplains, greeted the people donned in his regulation firefighter's coat.

He said, "We welcome the Teaneck Fire Department and their dedicated men, the two fire trucks, and the officers who are helping to create a learning experience in stressing fire safety for young children and families."
